F ACEVEDO Acevedo, Mario. *The nymphs of Rocky Flats* : Rayo, 2006

Skewering sexual myths, conspiracy fables, and government bureaucracy, this first book in a new Latino vampire series reveals the bizarre world of the undead with a humorous slant and a fresh twist.

F ADAMS Adams, Thelma. *Playdate* / Thomas Dunne Books, 2010

Inside the picture-perfect homes of a quiet California suburb the lives of the residents are not what they seem. As looming Santa Ana winds threaten to turn brushfires into catastrophe, the complicated relationships between families, spouses and children are examined and discovered to be as combustible as the brushfire on a windy day.

F ADRIAN Adrian, Chris, *The great night* / Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2011

How would Shakespeare's work have been different if he lived in San Francisco? Three people fleeing crumbled relationships find themselves in San Francisco's Buena Vista Park and cannot escape in this modern version of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream.' Out of grief, Titania unleashes a fury on the mortal world. Will she be able to undo the damage and deal with her grief?

F BATTLES Battles, Brett. *The deceived* / Delacorte Press, 2008

Jonathan Quinn has a few rules. He'll get rid of bodies that have to disappear; nothing ever gets traced back to him. But when Quinn is called to a busy Los Angeles port where a shipping container has just come in from the sea, it's clear his rules have been violated. Inside the crate is a dead man--a man who once saved Quinn's life. And while no one knows how CIA agent Steven Markoff died, Quinn has to do more than clean. He has to find Markoff's girlfriend, Jenny. To tell her that Markoff is dead. To find out why--and why someone sent Markoff's body to him. Until a week ago, Jenny Fuentes was an assistant to an ambitious congressman. Now Jenny is missing, too, and a lot of manpower is making sure she isn't found.

F BENNETT Bennett, Vanora, *The queen's lover* / William Morrow, 2009

After the death of her husband, King Henry V, Catherine of Valois is caught between warring factions and threatened by the powerful lords of the English court and her own scheming brother, forcing her to use her cunning to survive and protect her infant son.

F BERRY Berry, Steve, *The Jefferson key* : Ballantine Books, 2011

When a bold assassination attempt is made against President Danny Daniels in the heart of Manhattan, Malone risks his life to foil the killing, only to find himself at dangerous odds with the Commonwealth, a secret society of pirates first assembled during the American Revolution. In their most perilous exploit yet, Malone and

Cassiopeia Vitt race across the nation and take to the high seas. Along the way they break a secret cipher originally possessed by Thomas Jefferson, unravel a mystery concocted by Andrew Jackson, and unearth a centuries-old document forged by the Founding Fathers themselves, one powerful enough, thanks to that clause in the Constitution, to make the Commonwealth unstoppable.

F BOYLE Boyle, T. Coraghessan. World's end : Penguin Books, 1987 This epic novel is set in New York's Hudson Valley in three time periods: the late 17th century, the 1940s and the 1960s. It follows the interwoven destinies of three families (one Indian family and two Dutch settler families) during this time period. It begins with Walter Van Brunt, a descendant of Dutch yeomen, whose fondness for drugs and alcohol leads to a motorcycle accident in which he loses a foot. This precipitates two journeys: Walter's, as he searches for his lost father, who years before had deserted friends, son and wife; and ours, as we are drawn back through the centuries, and the secrets of the Van Brunts, the Van Warts and the Mohonks are at last revealed. The author has published four previous works of fiction.

F BRIGGS Briggs, Patricia. River marked / Ace Books, 2011
Car mechanic and shapeshifter Mercy Thompson has never known any others of her kind. Until now. As Mercy comes to terms with this new information, an evil is stirring in the depths of the Columbia River--and if Mercy and her mate, the Alpha werewolf Adam, are to have any hope of surviving, they will need all the resources the shifters can offer.

F BROOKS Brooks, Albert, 2030:00:00 St. Martin's Press, 2011
June 12, 2030 started out like any other day... until a massive earthquake devastated Los Angeles, and the government, always teetering on the edge of bankruptcy, was unable to respond.

F BROOKS Brooks, Geraldine. Caleb's crossing / Viking, 2011
Historical fact: In 1665, a young man from Martha's Vineyard became the first Native American to graduate from Harvard College. The narrator of the story is Bethia Mayfield, growing up in the tiny settlement of Great Harbor amid a small band of pioneers and Puritans. Restless and curious, she yearns after an education that is closed to her by her sex. As often as she can, she slips away to explore the island's glistening beaches and observe its native Wampanoag inhabitants. At twelve, she encounters Caleb, the young son of a chieftain, and the two forge a tentative secret friendship that draws each into the alien world of the other. Bethia's minister father tries to convert the Wampanoag, awakening the wrath of the tribe's shaman, against whose magic he must test his own beliefs. One of his projects becomes the education of Caleb, and a year later, Caleb is in Cambridge, studying Latin and Greek among the colonial elite. There, Bethia finds herself reluctantly indentured as a housekeeper and can closely observe Caleb's crossing of cultures. Bethia proves an emotionally irresistible guide to the wilds of Martha's Vineyard and the intimate spaces of the human heart.

F BRUNSTETTER Brunstetter, Wanda E. Lydia's charm / Barbour Pub., 2010
When Lydia King suddenly finds herself widowed and jobless, she moves to Charm, Ohio, to be close to her mother and help with her grandfather. But when tragedy strikes her young life yet again, can she find strength in a family of young boys who need a mother, or will the gifts from a secret admirer prompt her to pursue an impossible love?

F BUNDRICK Bundrick, Sheramy D. Sunflowers / Avon A, 2009
Art historian Bundrick offers a hauntingly beautiful debut novel about Vincent van Gogh's relationship with a mysterious young woman named Rachel, and the passion they share.

F BURTON Burton, Mary Merciless / Zebra Books, 2011
When bleached human bones are identified as belonging to a former patient of Dr. James Dixon, Detective Malcolm Kier suspects the worst. Dixon was recently acquitted of attempted murder, thanks to defense attorney Angie Carlson. But as the body count rises, Kier is convinced that Angie is now the target of a brutal, brilliant psychopath.

F CARR Carr, Robyn. Wild Man Creek / MIRA, 2011
"Colin Riordan came to Virgin River to recuperate from a horrific helicopter crash, the scars of which he bears inside and out. His family is wonderfully supportive, but it's his art that truly soothes his troubled soul. Stung personally and professionally by an ill-advised affair, PR guru Jillian Matlock has rented an old Victorian with a promising garden in Virgin River. She's looking forward to cultivating something other than a corporate brand. Both are looking to simplify, not complicate, their lives, but when Jillian finds Colin at his easel in her yard, there's an instant connection. And in Virgin River, sometimes love is the simplest choice of all..." -- P. [4] of cover.

F CHRISTENSEN Christensen, Kate, The Astral : Doubleday, 2011
Poet Harry Kirk and his family lived happily in a huge apartment building called The Astral. But when his wife Luz found poems Harry had written about his infidelity, she destroyed them and kicked him out of the house. Harry now had to deal with the consequences of his literary, marital, financial, and parental failures and find a way back into Luz's good graces.

F CHRISTENSEN Christensen, Kate, The great man : Anchor Books, 2007
Christensen pens a scintillating comedy of life among the avant-garde--of the untidy truths, needy egos, and jostling for position behind the glossy facade of artistic greatness--in this PEN Faulkner Award-winning story of a New York City painter living in the heroic generation of the 1940s and 1950s.

F COLLINS Collins, Wilkie, The woman in white / Penguin, 1974
The woman who first gives life, light, and form to our shadowy conceptions of beauty fills a void in our spiritual nature that has remained unknown to us till she appeared. One of the earliest works of detective fiction with a narrative woven together from

multiple characters, Wilkie Collins partly based his infamous novel on a real-life eighteenth century case of abduction and wrongful imprisonment. In 1859, the story caused a sensation with its readers, hooking their attention with the ghostly first scene where the mysterious 'Woman in White,' Anne Catherick, comes across Walter Hartright. Chilling, suspenseful and tense in mood, the novel remains as emotive for its readers today as when it was first published.

F COULTER Coulter, Catherine. Split second / G.P. Putnam's Sons, 2011

"A serial killer is on the loose, and it's up to FBI agents Dillon Savich and Lacey Sherlock to bring him down. They soon discover that the killer has blood ties to the infamous and now long-dead monster Ted Bundy. Savich and Sherlock are joined by agents Lucy Carlyle and Cooper McKnight, and the chase is on..." -- Jkt. flap.

F COULTER Coulter, Catherine. KnockOut / Jove Books, 2009

Traveling with her mother to Georgia in the aftermath of her father's death, seven-year-old telepath Autumn Backman discovers her own family's murderous activities, desperately contacts FBI agent Dillon Savich, and promptly disappears.

F DALLAS Dallas, Sandra. Alice's tulips / St. Martin's Griffin, 2000

Rich in details of quilting, Civil War-era America, and the realities of life in the 19th century, "Alice's Tulips" is the triumphant story of one woman's survival during a time of murder, intrigue, and treachery.

F DELINSKY Delinsky, Barbara. Escape / Doubleday, 2011

Emily Aulenbach is thirty, a lawyer married to a lawyer, working in Manhattan. An idealist, she had once dreamed of representing victims of corporate abuse, but she spends her days in a cubicle talking with victims of tainted bottle water and she's on the bottler's side.

F DEMILLE DeMille, Nelson. Plum Island / Warner Books, 1997

When Tom and Judy Gordon are found murdered in their waterfront home on the North Fork of Long Island, it appears to be a burglary gone wrong. But when NYPD detective John Corey is brought in on the case, he discovers, to his horror, that the Gordons may have been stealing and selling genetically-altered viruses. If so, who is the buyer? Is a deadly plague about to be released?

F DOYLE Doyle, Roddy. Bullfighting / Viking, 2011

A collection of stories set in modern Ireland explores a theme of loss, from a man who remembers his early family life while taking daily prescribed walks to a father who considers the impact of his children's pets.

F EVANOVICH Evanovich, Janet. Smokin' seventeen : Bantam Books, 2011

Dead bodies are showing up in shallow graves on the empty construction lot of Vincent Plum Bail Bonds. No one is sure who the killer is, or why the victims have been offed, but what is clear is that Stephanie's name is on the killer's list.

F EVANS Evans, Geraldine. Bad blood / Severn House Large Print, 2004

Investigating the murder of wealthy widow Clara Mortimer, estranged from her family and living alone in an up-market sheltered apartment, Rafferty fears his own family estrangement. Because when Abra, his girlfriend, said she might be pregnant, his reaction wasn't exactly New Man. Between the grudges of Clara's estranged family and those of her adoptive 'family'--the other apartment residents--Rafferty had suspects and questions in plenty. Why had the sensible Clara Mortimer chosen to open her door to a burglar? Why had her daughter insisted Clara's husband was dead? And when he considered the other awful lies her family told, how could he not conclude they had something to hide? As Rafferty tries to get back into Abra's good books another tragedy ensues. But still he manages to fight his way past all the lies to find the sad truth—a very modern murder.

F EVANS Evans, Richard Paul. The walk / Simon & Schuster, 2010

Alan Christoffersen loses his wife, his business, and his home and embarks on a cross country walk, leaving behind what little is left of his life, and in the course of his journey, the people he meets and the places he visits offer him hope, inspiration, and refuge.

F EVANS Evans, Richard Paul. Miles to go : Simon & Schuster, 2011

Alan Christoffersen, a once-successful advertising executive, wakes one morning to find himself injured, alone, and confined to a hospital bed in Spokane, Washington. Sixteen days earlier, reeling from the sudden loss of his wife, his home, and his business, Alan left everything he knew behind and set off on an extraordinary cross-country journey. Carrying only a backpack, he planned to walk to Key West, the farthest destination on his map. But a vicious roadside stabbing has interrupted Alan's trek and robbed him of his one source of solace: the ability to walk. F EVISON Evison, Jonathan. West of here : Algonquin Books of Chapel Hill, 2011

Since the dawn of recorded history, the Klallam Indians have thrived upon the bounty of the Elwha River. In 1889, on the eve of Washington's statehood, the Olympic Peninsula remains America's last frontier. But not for long. As northwestern expansion reaches its feverish crescendo, the clock is ticking...

F FEEHAN Feehan, Christine. Burning wild / Jove Books/Penguin, 2009

Bred for his leopard-shifting abilities, billionaire Jake Bannaconni lives in an emotional vacuum after a tragic twist of fate left him to raise his infant son alone.

But when his path crosses that of the enigmatic young Emma Reynolds whom he hires as his son's nanny, Jake becomes inflamed by a passion that he has never fathomed.

F FINCH Finch, Charles The Fleet Street murders / Minotaur Books, 2009

Celebrating the 1866 holiday season at the side of his fiancée, amateur sleuth Charles Lenox is drawn into the double-homicide case of two reporters, an investigation that is complicated by a police ruling that the killings are unrelated.

F FOLLETT Follett, Ken. The pillars of the earth / New American Library, 1989

Set in the twelfth-century England when the empress Maud and Stephen are fighting for the crown of England after the death of Henry, chronicles the struggle to build a cathedral.

F FORSTCHEN Forstchen, William R. One second after / Forge, 2009

One man struggles to save his family and his small North Carolina town after America loses a war, in one second, a war based upon an Electro Magnetic Pulse (EMP) weapon that will send America back to the Dark Ages.

F FOWLER Fowler, Christopher. Bryant & May on the loose : Bantam Books, 2009

After the Peculiar Crimes Unit crosses the wrong bureaucrat, they're disbanded. When a man dressed as a giant stag starts haunting a building site and a headless body turns up in a freezer, they're put back into action. As the Unit investigates clues found buried underneath St. Pancras Church, they become locked in a battle of wits with a remorseless villain.

F FOWLER Fowler, Earlene. Spider web / Berkley Prime Crime, 2011

The Memory Festival is a celebration of recollections and loved ones through crafts. But when a local cop is wounded by a mysterious sharpshooter who seems to have a vendetta against the police, Benni fears for "her" loved ones, especially her police chief husband.

F FRAYN Frayn, Rebecca. Deceptions : Washington Square Press, 2010

Julian and Annie have only just announced their forthcoming marriage when Annie's twelve-year-old son, Dan, fails to come home from school. Despite an extensive police investigation, the days turn into weeks and it is as if Dan has vanished into thin air. Over the next three years Annie refuses to give up hope that somewhere her son is alive and will one day return home. Julian, meanwhile, can't help but yearn for Annie to put the past behind her and move on. Then, out of the blue, a call brings shocking news of Dan's fate. And far from being over, it seems the mystery of his disappearance is only just beginning.

F GAIMAN Gaiman, Neil. American gods : W. Morrow, 2001

Shadow gets out of prison early when his wife is killed in a car crash. At a loss, he takes up with a mysterious character called Wednesday, who is much more than he appears. In fact, Wednesday is an old god, once known as Odin the All-father, who is

roaming America rounding up his forgotten fellows in preparation for an epic battle against the upstart deities of the Internet, credit cards, television, and all that is wired.

F GEORGE LP George, Elizabeth, This body of death HarperLuxe, 2010

On compassionate leave after the murder of his wife, Thomas Lynley is called back to Scotland Yard when the body of a woman is found stabbed and abandoned in an isolated London cemetery. While Lynley works on the case in London, his former colleagues Barbara Havers and Winston Nkata follow the murder trail south to the New Forest--and to an outcome that is both tragic and shocking.

F GERRITSEN Gerritsen, Tess. The silent girl : Ballantine Books, 2011

Boston homicide detective Jane Rizzoli is already at the crime scene when medical examiner Maura Isles arrives on the Chinatown rooftop. Rizzoli's gut says they're on the trail of a twisted predator and when a monkey hair is found on the body, other clues point Rizzoli and Isles in the direction of the fable of the Monkey King.

F GODWIN Godwin, Gail. Unfinished desires : Ballantine Books, 2010

Sparking enthusiasm for a play about the founding of their North Carolina mountains Catholic girls' school, a charismatic ninth grader and her recently orphaned best friend set in motion a series of events that have decades-long ramifications.

F GOLDENBAUM Goldenbaum, Sally. Death by cashmere / Obsidian, 2008

When an official investigation rules the death of a Sea Harbor woman an accident, Izzy and the Seaside Knitters smell something fishy and decide to take matters into their own hands.

F GORDON Gordon, Alan The Parisian prodigal : Minotaur Books, 2010

"Only a fool would pass this one up." --Laurie R. King In 1205, Theophilos--a fool by trade, a family man by choice, and a spy by design--belongs, along with his family, to the Fools' Guild, a group that secretly maintains the fragile order of society. In Toulouse, that order is threatened when, unexpectedly, a man claiming to be a full brother of the ruling count is found one morning in a local bordello next to a dead whore, killed with his own sword. Now, Theophilos and his family must uncover the truth.

F GORDON Gordon, Mary, The love of my youth / Pantheon Books 2011

This work is a novel about first lovers meeting again after more than thirty years, walking the streets of Rome and reimmersing themselves in their lost past. Miranda and Adam, high school sweethearts now in their late fifties, arrive by chance at the same time in Rome, where they once spent a summer deeply in love, blissfully living together. At an awkward reunion, the two, who parted in an atmosphere of passionate betrayal in the 1960s and haven't seen each other since, are surprised to discover that they may still have something to talk about; they decide that, for these few weeks, they will take daily walks together. As they experience Rome, the pleasures of eye and palate, and the daily drama of the streets, they review their

lives (married to others, and with grown children) and gradually explore not just what matters to them now, but what happened to them long ago. Miranda and Adam are masterfully portrayed characters, intent on understanding who they are in relation to who they were. Theirs is a rich and wise story of forgiveness and reckoning.

F GRAFTON Grafton, Sue. "A" is for alibi : Bantam, 1987

A woman wrongly convicted of murdering her husband hires private detective Kinsey Millhone to find the real killer.

F GRAVES Graves, Sarah. Trap door / Bantam Books, 2006

When Jacobia Jake Tiptree leaves Wall Street for the charming town of Eastport, Maine, she expects a quiet life fixing up her 1823 Federal-style house. However, the perils of the stock market pale in comparison to the murder, mayhem, and mystery of remodeling.

F GREENWOOD Greenwood, Kerry. Dead man's chest : Poisoned Pen Press, 2010

When she tries to go on summer holiday, Phryne Fisher discovers that the Johnsons, who were supposed to be at the vacation home, are nowhere in sight, beginning a mystery that involves smugglers, pirate treasure, and the mysterious Madame Selavey.

F GREENWOOD Greenwood, T. This glittering world / Kensington Books, 2011

When he stumbles upon Ricky, a young Navajo man, beaten and dying in the newly fallen snow, part-time history professor Ben Bailey questions everything in his life, including his relationship with his fiancée Sara, and decides to discover the truth about Ricky's death.

F GRISHAM Grisham, John. The pelican brief / Island Books : | Dell, 1992

A bright young law student and an investigative reporter go underground when trying to expose a cover-up about the killings of two Supreme Court Justices.

F HADLEY Hadley, Tessa. The London train / Harper Perennial, 2011

After the death of his mother, Paul abandons his family to live life on the edge with his daughter from a previous marriage who is pregnant and living in a run-down council flat, while Cora rebels against her marriage and society.

F HANNAH Hannah, Kristin. Firefly Lane / St. Martin's Griffin, 2008

Inseparable best friends Kate and Tully, two young women who despite their very different lives have vowed to be there for each other forever, have been true to their promise for thirty years, until events and choices in their lives tear them apart.

F HART Hart, Megan. Precious and fragile things / MIRA, 2011

"Gilly Soloman has been reduced to a mothering machine, taking care of everyone and everything except herself. But the machine has broken down. Burnt out by the endless days of crying children and menial tasks, and exhausted from always putting herself last, Gilly doesn't immediately consider the consequences when she's carjacked. With a knife to her throat, her first thought is that she'll finally get some rest. Someone

can save her for a change. But salvation isn't so forthcoming. Stranded in a remote, snowbound cabin with this stranger, hours turn to days, days into weeks. As time forges a fragile bond between them, she learns her captor is not the lunatic she first believed, but a human being whose wasted life has been shaped by secrets and tragedy. F HEADLEY Headley, Maria Dahvana, Queen of kings / Dutton,, 2011

The year is 30 BC. A messenger delivers word to Queen Cleopatra that her beloved husband, Antony, has died at his own hand. Desperate to save her kingdom and resurrect her husband, Cleopatra summons the most fearsome warrior goddess, Sekhmet, and against the warnings of her scholars she strikes a mortal bargain. But not even the wisest scholars could have predicted what would follow...In exchange for Antony's soul, Cleopatra is transformed into a vampiric creature of mythical proportions, an immortal shapeshifter with superhuman strength and an insatiable hunger for human blood--a being at once ferocious and seductive. And she is bent on vengeance against those who have wronged her family and her kingdom. Clashing against witches and monsters, gods and warriors, Cleopatra journeys from the tombs of Egypt to the great amphitheaters of Rome to the ancient underworld--where she will meet her love once again, and where the battle between man and beast will determine the fate of the world.

F HENDERSON Henderson, Eleanor. Ten thousand saints / Ecco, 2011

When his best friend Teddy dies of an overdose on the last day of 1987, Jude Keffy-Horn finds his relationship with drugs and his parents devolving into the extreme when he gets caught up in an underground youth culture known as straight edge.

F HICKMAN Hickman, Tracy. The immortals / ROC, 1996

The co-author of ten New York Times science fiction bestsellers--including The Deathgate Cycle series--offers a new tale bristling with heart-pounding suspense. It is the year 2010 and the United States is ravaged by disease and martial law. Though fear runs rampant across the land, one man dares to challenge the government's tightening grip.

F HILDERBRAND Hilderbrand, Elin. Silver girl : Little, Brown and Co., 2011

Facing homelessness and a loss of social standing after her husband cheats rich investors out of billions of dollars, Meredith and her best friend, Connie, who has troubles of her own, escape to Nantucket to heal.

F HODGKINSON Hodgkinson, Amanda. 22 Britannia Road / Pamela Dorman Books/Viking, 2011

In this tale of a Polish family desperately trying to put itself back together after WWII, Silvana and Janusz travel to England where they attempt to put the past behind them. But the secrets they carry pull at the threads of their fragile peace.

F HORNSBY Hornsby, Wendy. *The paramour's daughter : Perseverance* Press/John Daniel & Co. ; | Distributed by SCB Distributors, 2010
Filmmaker Maggie MacGowen discovers that she was adopted and that her birth mother has left her relatives in France and a tangled inheritance.

F IRWIN Irwin, Stephen M. *The dead path : Doubleday, 2010*
After the death of his wife, Nicholas Close becomes haunted, literally, by ghosts. Torn by guilt and fearing for his sanity, he returns home to Tallong, Australia, and becomes entangled in a disturbing series of disappearances and murders--both as a suspect and as the next victim of the malignant evil lurking in the heart of the woods.

F ITANI Itani, Frances, *Deafening / Grove Press, 2003*
Born on the shores of Lake Ontario, Grania O'Neill suffers a childhood illness that destroys her hearing. Grania's life without sound is also a life bounded by a powerful family love that tries to protect her from suffering. But when it becomes clear that Grania can no longer thrive among the hearing, her family sends her to the Ontario School for the Deaf. There, protected from the often unforgiving world outside, she learns sign language and speech. And there she meets Jim Lloyd, a hearing man, and the two, in wonderment, begin to create a new emotional vocabulary that encompasses both sound and silence. But a war is raging on the other side of the world. Only two weeks after their wedding, Jim must leave home to serve as a stretcher-bearer on the blood-soaked battlefields of Flanders. During this long and brutal war of attrition, Jim and Grania are pulled to the center of cataclysmic events that will alter civilization forever.

F JOHANSEN Johansen, Iris. Quinn / St. Martin's Press, 2011
As a former Navy seal turned cop, Joe Quinn has seen the face of evil and knows just how deadly it can be. When he first met Eve Duncan, he never expected to fall in love with a woman whose life would be defined by her dual desires to bring home her missing daughter and discover the truth behind her disappearance--no matter how devastating. The character David Foster Wallace is introduced to the banal world of the IRS Regional Examination Center in Peoria, Illinois, and the host of strange people who work there, in a novel that was unfinished at the time of the author's death.

F WOLFF Wolff, Rebecca, *The beginners* / Riverhead Books, 2011

Struggling for a greater understanding of the world as she approaches young adulthood in her sleepy New England town, Ginger is drawn to newcomers Theo and Raquel Motherwell and becomes fascinated by their past.

F WOOD Wood, Monica. *My only story* / Ballantine Books, 2001

Rita, a hair stylist in her thirties attuned to the needs of others and the ways that she can help, meets John Reed, who, she observes, "though not yet out of his 30s, seemed old, the way all sad people do". Less than half a year after sniper school, he was fighting for his life. The mission: capture or kill Somalian warlord Mohamed Farrah Aidid. From rooftops, helicopters and alleys, Wasdin hunted Aidid and killed his men whenever possible. But everything went quickly to hell when his small band of soldiers found themselves fighting for their lives, cut off from help, and desperately trying to rescue downed comrades during a routine mission. The Battle of Mogadishu, as it became known, left 18 American soldiers dead and 73 wounded. Howard Wasdin had both of his legs nearly
